River Road Realignment

Work has commenced on the re-alignment of River Road.


Background

In the early 1970's a large area of land between Mangaone Road and Nuhaka River Road began to move and continued to do so resulting in the lower end of the earthflow affecting the Nuhaka River Road.

The road became severely damaged and several attempts were made over the subsequent years to repair the road to keep it open to keep land accessible to land owners and local community whanau on the other side of the slip.

There was no permanent or safe access for landowners and community.

Wairoa District Council undertook to close the affected area of road to the Public, (to all affected parties).



In May 2020 Central Government announced 100% funding approval for this project. Rakaipaaka Trustees successfully negotiated inclusion for the commissioning of both a Cultural and Environmental Impact Assessments to be undertaken.

Approximately 20 people attended a blessing that was held at the site on Saturday 4th July, including Wairoa District Council, Hawkes Bay Regional Council, Quality Roding Services Engineers and Staff, Maori Landowners, local farmers, residence that live in and around the area and Rakaipaaka Whanau Whanui.

The arrow indicates where the river is currently situated and where the river will be diverted to, to make way for the new road that will be realigned to where the river currently is.

The project is monitored weekly and is progressing well. Rakaipaaka will keep you all updated on progress.

Pine Valley Orchard will soon have the latest in horticultural growing practice, stronger employment prospects and sustainability. A \$200,000 loan to the orchard to go towards tunnel houses and a reservoir, it could see up to 12 new jobs. Owners Micheal Montgomery and Grant Eynon gave Under-secretary for Regional Economic Development Fletcher Tabuteau a tour of the Orchard after his visit in Wairoa where he announced a provincial Growth Fund (PGF) investment of \$3.78 Million in Wairoa to create economic stimulus and jobs.

Benefits of the tunnel houses include spreading employment over longer periods and the ability to work inside the tunnel houses in bad weather and outside on fine days. They will also capture rain water which will be stored in the new reservoir. The new water storage will hold up to 14,000 cubic metres, this will extend their water capacity and magnify their existing water consent. *"it is about utilisation of existing assets and infrastructure to create more employment and sustainable profitability"*.

The Orchard grow 10ha of apples, 7ha of Gold Kiwi fruit and 4ha of Kiwiberries.



Once covid-19 restrictions lifted a poroporoaki and memorial service was held for te Rangatira Matenga Hapi at Kahungunu Marae and Nuhaka Chapel. Many Whanau, friends and colleagues came together from near and far to acknowledge and celebrate his life.

It was a great turn out and wonderful tributes were expressed.




Wairoa Horticulture Hub

- Integrated package aimed at resolving issues constraining rapid and widespread horticulture.
- Opportunities: Land, climate, location and water.
- Forestry conversion threatening viability of meat works. 5 years at most.
- Challenges; transport to market, capital costs of conversions, available workforce, perception of difficult place to do business.
- Horticulture could transform the Wairoa economy with meaningful employment opportunities and over time help support an eco-system of Wairoa-based services that traditionally collect around horticulture.
- **Current PGF Application:** Years 1-3 Land advisory service; training programme; trial orchard; programme management. **\$5.5m**
- **Future Project:** Years 4-16 Multi-product post-harvest facility (vertically integrated) Stage 1: \$9,875,000; Stage 2: \$8,437,535; Stage 3: \$8,437,535; Stage 4: \$8,435,535.
- Over 10-year period: **197 FTEs, \$81.7m** additional local expenditure.




Current Asset Mix vs Target

Recipe...

Rakaipaaka Steam pudding

Ingredient

4 oz Butter
2 Tbsp golden syrup
2 1/2 Cup flour
1 1/4 Cup milk
1 Cup sugar
2 eggs
1 tsp baking powder
1/2 tsp baking soda



Method

Cream butter and sugar until thick, pale yellow and fluffy. Add golden syrup and eggs and beat into a cream mixture. Add sifted flour and baking powder. Add baking soda in 1/4 hot milk, then add 1 cup of milk or a little more until mixture is a smooth paste. Pour into a greased tin, cover with foil and put into pot of (filled halfway) boiling water. Cover and cook for approximately one hour, checking the water level, to make sure that the water level is always halfway. Cook on high.

DENIL MEIHANA

Denil is a grandson of Peter Bartlett. His mother, Harae Bartlett, was born at Kopuawhara.

Peter lived just over the hill from Denil's home. He made whaling boats that took eight rowers, and sold them for £19. It was Denil's job to cap the hand-forged nails as his grandfather built the boats.

Peter also milked cows. Denil, for 10 shillings per month, brought the cows in each milking. He said 'We didn't have shoes in those days. It was so cold in the mornings, frosty — we used to stand in the fresh cow pats to warm our feet up.'

In later years, Denil worked on the railway. He was there at the time of the Kopuawhara disaster. That particular night, it happened that he was in Nuhaka. He and some of his workmates had gone to the pub, and because they had only one light on the car and 'It was raining so hard you couldn't see anything', they decided to stay the night in Nuhaka. The rain that kept them there was the cloudburst that caused the flood.

The next day they returned to a scene of devastation. Denil's hut had been washed away. He helped to search for the bodies — some were found as far away as the Oraka lagoon.

Denil also helped build the retaining walls below the railway at Opoutama. One day they were at Waikokopu and some Kahawai were spotted. Prayer Smith decided fresh Kahawai would be nice for lunch. His method of fishing was to light a stick of dynamite to throw in — but he held it too long and lost his hand instead!
